> spirit, we can all move forward together.


> organization for service to veterans. But, there are still lots of veterans that are unaware of us and the impact we could have on their lives. The spirit of the DAV here in California is one of innovation.

hat I appreciate most about my


position as your new Jr. Vice Commander, is that I have the

# CALIFORNIA VETERANS' LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

what we've for years to allow 100%

or veterans, now is a time to celebrate what we've achieved as well as to steel ourselves to keep up the fight for much-needed veterans' benefits. In June, legislation passed creating Public Law 115-182: the VA Mission Act of 2018. This contains Health Care Reform, Caregiver Program Expansion, and Infrastructure Modernization. All of this will affect disabled veterans' healthcare and benefits, including the Choice Program, Caregiver support for pre-9/11 veterans, new Claims and Appeals (RAMP) processing, and IT Modernization.

service-connected disabled
veterans to fly Space A Travel
like retirees and their spouses. The National Defense
Appropriation Authorization of 2019 (NDAA) was
recently passed and authorizes the DoD the authority to
grant this privilege to certain 100% service-connected
disabled veterans, but with one major exception: the
privilege is not extended to spouses as it is with retirees.
This is likely to reduce the number of disabled veterans
looking to utilize Space A Travel, since I imagine keeping
peace on the home-front will be worth

more than taking a Space A flight for many veterans.

Regarding our legislative activities here in California, we are making inroads. Our efforts supported bills that are affecting veterans and the judicial system by making veteran treatment courts more accessible to veterans.

and a bill designating a highway as a "Medal of Honor Memorial Highway." We've also brought the "DAV's Guide to Hiring and Retaining Veterans with Disabilities" to our legislators' attention for use by the Employment Development Department (EDD) and state government hiring authorities and employers.

Those who never change their mind, never change anything. We should be in the business of helping those who seem least-inclined to change to see the benefits of change and the positive effect it will have on improving the lives of injured and ill veterans, their spouses and dependents.

This is encouraging, but we must remain focused in the coming months on the VA Mission Act's implementation timelines and eligibility requirements, which are currently in development. If we step back now, we may find ourselves with less then what we need and the possibility that some of our brothers and sisters who served are left without any noticeable improvements to the quality of the healthcare and services they've earned. To give a couple examples, there are still unresolved hot-button issues involving the Blue Water Navy Agent Orange exposure and Iraq/Afghanistan veterans suffering from Burn Pit exposure.

I know there are those within our organization who have used our resolutions process to petition the DoD

# **COMMANDER'S AWARDS** - Recognize Excellence in Your Community!

ometimes our lives as injured or ill veterans can be difficult and stressful. But we here at the DAV want to celebrate the individuals in our communities and in our state that make things a bit easier. We want to recognize excellence and reward those who give so much to veterans. That is why we have the Commander's Awards program. The available awards are as follows:

- Outstanding Disabled Veteran of the Year Nominee must be a service-connected disabled veteran, current member of DAV or eligible for membership, and have overcome his/her disability to become an inspiration to others.
- Outstanding Member of the Dept. of Veterans Affairs Veterans Health Administration (VHA)/ Outstanding Member of the Dept. of Veterans Affairs Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA)/ Outstanding Member of the Dept. of Veterans Affairs National Cemetery Administration (NCA) Nominees must be a member of the VHA, VBA or NCA, exemplify DAV's mission and motivate others to serve veterans and their families also.
- Large Employer of the Year (200 or more employees)
  /Small Employer of the Year (less than 200 employees)
   should recruit and hire veterans, nurture a sense of community with and build an environment of success for

veteran employees, and participate in outreach efforts to support veterans within their community.

- Local Veterans Employment Representative/
  Disabled Veterans Outreach Program Nominee must be
  a Local Veterans Employment Representative or Disabled
  Veterans Outreach Program Specialist who has excelled in
  outreach, counseling, job development, training, placement
  or employer contact on behalf of veterans. They should also
  motivate others to serve and effectively connect employers,
  veterans and appropriate community organizations.
- Jesse Brown Memorial Youth Scholarship Nominee must be 21 years of age or younger and have a minimum of 100 hours annually credited to the DAV through the VAVS Program, DAV Auxiliary, or DAV's LVAP.
- DAV & DAV Auxiliary George H. Seal Memorial Awards Nominee must be a DAV or DAV Auxiliary member and should be an extraordinary volunteer through the VA Voluntary Service Program
